LOOKING UP



S ome will see it as soon as they walk in. Others are taken by surprise, or perhaps have to have it pointed out to them by a steward. However you come upon it, there is no way you can look at the painting by John Constable of *The Ascension* without looking up at it.

Set more that three metres above an archway to the South porch of Dedham church, in north Essex, it is at a height that few paintings are displayed. It was not just security that suggested that location was a good idea, for there was simply nowhere else to put it within the church as the rest of the wall space is taken up with the many great windows and by umpteen memorials. As one wit put it, when you see the painting for the first time it is as if you've arrived at the scene of the Ascension — but a few moments late!

Along with the churchwardens, I was involved in making a case to *The Constable Trust*, who own the painting, to have it displayed in that church, so that another genuine Constable painting could be seen in 'Constable Country'. The Stour Valley on the Essex-Suffolk border has been called that since the painter's own lifetime, in the early 19th century.

Art historians had called the painting *The Risen Christ*, which was a rather ambiguous title for it could imply that it was about the Resurrection. When the painting was returned from the conservators a rather murky area in the bottom right of the painting had become clearer. It revealed a man's face, with his hands clasping the sides of his face in an expression of awe, being a witness to a remarkable moment.

It was pointed out to the Trustees that, according to the Gospels, there was no human witness to the moment of the Resurrection, so this must be a painting of the Ascension, at which we are told the Apostles Peter, James and John were present (Luke 24, Acts 1).

Ascension Day is celebrated this year on 26 May, coming as it always does forty days after Easter Day. Following his death and resurrection, the risen Christ appeared again and again to his disciples. We know only a little of what he did during that time but we do know that he was seen by many people, including by some on the road to Emmaus, by the Sea of Galilee, and elsewhere.

He strengthened and encouraged these people, opening their eyes to all that had been promised about the Messiah. He told them that, as the Father had sent him, he was now going to send them, to all corners of the earth, as his witnesses. It is partly the reason that Christianity eventually spread to become the largest and most widespread faith there has ever been.

Ascensiontide is therefore a time of encouragement, of 'looking up' to Christ, and through Him giving us renewed hope, of not allowing discouragement from any source to 'get us down' spiritually.

hose who remember the comedy monologues of Stanley Holloway, of *My Fair Lady* fame, and Mariott Edgar, who wrote *The Lion and Albert* series, may recognise the source of these lines (to be read in a Lancashire accent):

It rained and it rained for a fortni't, And flooded the 'ole countryside. It rained and it kept' on raining, 'Til the Irwell were fifty mile wide.

The 'ouses were soon under water, And folks to the roof 'ad to climb. They said 'twas the rottenest summer That Bury 'ad 'ad for some time.

Noah cruised around, flying 'is pigeons, 'Til fortieth day of 'The Wet'... he said 'The sky's took a turn since this morning; I think it'll brighten up yet.'

help us to seek and serve you, that we may join you at the Father's side, where you reign with the Spirit in glory, now and for ever. Amen


For Peace
